

The Judith Basin County Fair Board and 4-H Council are pleased to dedicate the 2025 Judith Basin County Fair to Jim Moore.

Jim was born and raised in Gallatin Valley, attending high school in Belgrade. He earned his degree in Vocational Agriculture from MSU. Jim taught at Rapelje, Ronan and Missoula before returning to Gallatin Valley to farm and ranch. Eventually he and Aline relocated to Stanford in 1992 where he began his tenure as the JB Co. MSU Extension Agent. A role which he served in until 2003. In 2003 Jim began his work for the Montana Sheep Institute, serving as the Regional Sheep Inst. Agent. Jim was passionate about teaching and encouraging the next generation to learn the art of sheep shearing. Shortly after retiring from the Regional Sheep Institute, Jim entered politics and successfully ran for County Commissioner. A position he continues to serve in today.

Special Youth Awards



Montana Simmental Association - Award for the Grand Champion Market Steer, Grand Champion Carcass, and Grand Champion Female for 4-H or FFA if the animal is identified as being Simmental.

Montana Hereford Association - Award a Hereford jacket to the following: <u>Grand Champion Steer</u> of the live show if property documented as Hereford. <u>Top Steer of Merit</u> if properly documented as being at least 50% Hereford ancestry.

<u>Supreme Champion Female or equivalent</u> (i.e. overall breeds & ages showing) if documented as being a purebred Hereford.

<u>Champion Hereford Steer or Female</u> if documented as being Hereford.

Montana Gelbvieh Association - will pay \$10 to any 4-H or FFA exhibitor who receives a blue ribbon on their Gelbvieh or Gelbvieh-cross animal. All phases of competition are eligible, i.e. carcass, live steer, weight gain and breeding animals. Showmanship is not eligible. In addition to the \$10 for a blue ribbon, the MGA will pay \$100 to the top Gelbvieh influenced steer in it's class.

Montana and Wyoming Salers Association Award - Will award a cash prize to any County Champion Steer. Steer must be at least 50% Salers (provable) from either/or both sire and dam.

Montana Red Angus Association - Will award to any Champion or Reserve Red Angus steer a Montana Silversmith Buckle. Red Angus steers are to be progeny or a registered Red Angus bull or out of a registered Red Angus cow. Need not be purebred but must be at least 50%. Contact Deichmann Livestock, P.O. Box 310, Hobson, MT 59452.

Montana Black Angus Jacket Award - Awarded for the winning Champion Black Angus Breeding Project. Animals must be straight Black Angus, registered or commercial, Red Angus does not qualify. Winner may be in any youth division. Winner must win an overall class against 3 other breeds. (If there are not 3 other breeds in an overall class, there will be no winner of the jacket). Qualifying breeding projects include cow/calf pairs, yearling bred heifers, heifer calves, and bulls.

Judith Basin County Fair 4-H Herdsmanship Award - Kyle & Lindsay Schmitt Family- Buckles will be awarded to the Junior, Intermediate and Senior top Herdsman.

Montana Black Angus Beef Buckle Award - Montana Angus Auxiliary sponsors a Montana Silversmith Angus belt buckle on the county level to the Outstanding Exhibitor with a Black Angus Heifer, cow or cow/calf pair in the breeding project. Red Angus does not apply. Stevenson Angus donates the buckle. The animal must receive a blue ribbon in the breeding project. Quality of the exhibitor's project must be considered. Number of animals exhibited in the project and completed records will also be taken into consideration.

Beef of Choice Award - Sponsored by Montana Angus Association. This award is given to the animals and carcasses that meet Certified Angus Beef Product live animal and carcass specifications. Animals are ranked by marbling scores. Winners will receive a \$50 savings bond, a CAB Product cap, and a package of CAB Product steaks.

Montana Gelbvieh Assoc. Youth Cash Awards Program - A \$50 cash award to 4-H or FFA exhibitors with the highest placing Gelbvieh or Gelbvieh influenced animal. Will also pay \$10 to any 4-H or FFA exhibitor who receives a blue ribbon on their Gelbvieh or Gelbvieh cross animal.

Judith Basin Quilter's Guild - Additional premium money to be given for rosettes, blue, red and white ribbons for 4-H Clothing projects.

ALL decisions made by the Judith Basin County Fair Board regarding the fair are final.

Admission to the Fair will be free. The Fair Board and it's management will use care and precaution to prevent damage or loss of any article or animal, but will not assume any liability for loss or damage of exhibits.

Rules and Regulations

General

All ages are as of October 1, 2024 and apply to all project areas. This includes Small Animal in 2025.

Junior : 8-10 years

Intermediate: 11-13 years
Senior: 14 years and over

- 1. Youth entry forms shall be received through fairentry.com by Monday June 23, 2025, 5:00pm. Late entries will be accepted June 24 June 30, 2025. Late entry fee is \$25 per person. Late entries must be completed through the Extension Office. No entries will be accepted after June 30, 2025.
- 2. Youth members can enter exhibits only from projects in which they are enrolled. Exhibits must be the work of the 4-H member and made during the current 4-H club year. 4-H'ers may exhibit in ONE (highest) level of project only. Members must participate in interview judging.
- 3. Members must also bring up-to-date 4-H project records to Interview Judging. FFA members must bring up-to-date SAE and feed records, and participate in interview judging.



- 4. All exhibits except livestock are to be brought in at the time of the member interview judging on **Tuesday July 29.** Exhibits are to be displayed in the exhibit building following interviews with exhibit card attached.
- 5. Parents and leaders are <u>not allowed</u> at interview judging table.
- 6. To receive any premium money, you must participate in both set-up and take down.
- 7. All Department A Exhibits will be placed as follows; 1st group blue, 2nd group red, 3rd group white. If no exhibits in a lot merits a blue ribbon, none will be given. Exhibits not meeting requirements will be disqualified. Only blue ribbons will be considered for Champion, Reserve or Best of Show. Champion and Best of Show will be awarded at the judge's discretion.
- Work done in school, FFA, FCCLA or other organizations can be used to fulfill 4-H project requirements. FFA entries must be consistent with the member's SAE project.
- 9. A complaint or violation of fair rules should be first presented to the Barn Superintendent for resolution. Complaints must be in writing and signed by the person making the complaint. If not resolved, the complaint will then be presented to a committee composed of the Superintendent, the Extension Agent, and one member of the 4-H Council. Violators will be given one warning. A second violation will result in disqualification from classes, including market and showmanship, and market livestock sale.
- 10. If a 4-H member would like to ask for a rule exception, a "Petition for Rule Exception" form must be completed and turned into the 4-H Council. Rule exceptions should be requested as soon as it is discovered to be necessary. Exceptions will not be considered later than 10 (ten) days prior to the fair. Forms are available at the Extension Office in Stanford.

Educational Displays / Posters

Educational displays should not be limited solely to posters, but must also include ways to exhibit what was learned and the results. Posters: All posters and educational displays should be based on the level of the project. The size of posters may be full size (22"x28"), or half size (14"x22"). Posters should be readable from a distance of 20'. You may choose any color. Posters must be labeled on the back with name, address, club and lot number.

Cloverbuds

Cloverbuds may display up to 6 items. Please bring items to the exhibit building on July 29 during interview judging. Items displayed should be non-perishable. Participation ribbons will be awarded.

Open Pet Show

All youth up to age 8 are invited to participate in the Open Pet Show. The Pet Show will be held at 4:30 on Friday August 1st in a parade format around the show arena. No large animals allowed.

Livestock

- 1. Each member may enter more than one market animal per lot but only one will sell in the livestock sale.
- 2. **Beef** may be entered in only **ONE** Breeding Division in addition to Showmanship. Swine, sheep, goat and poultry may enter more than one Breeding Division.
- Livestock superintendents will assign stalls. There is no early entry to reserve stalls. Clubs will be placed together.
- 4. Livestock arrive on Tuesday July 29. Market livestock arrival and weigh-in times are Sheep/Goat 3-3:45pm, Swine 3:45-5:15pm, Beef 5:15-6pm. Weight at this time will be the official sale weight. A1% allowance of required weight for animals who don't make minimum species weight will be applied. Animals may be penned in the barn until the species designated weigh-in time. Animals must arrive prior to the end of their weigh in time.
- 5. All market animals attending the fair must be weighed and identified by their respective weigh deadlines in order to be exhibited at the fair.

Beef- Only steers are eligible for beef market classes. All male animals must be completely neutered prior to weigh and tag deadline. No stags will be allowed.

Sheep & Goats - Market classes are open to wether and ewe lambs. All male animals must be completely neutered prior to weigh and tag deadline. Market classes are open to billy and nanny goats. All market animal rules apply.

Swine - Market classes are open to barrows and gilts. All male animals must be completely neutered prior to weigh and tag deadline.

- 5. All project interviews will be held on Tuesday July 29. Unless done prior to the fair with the Extension Agent.
- 6. 4-H and FFA members are responsible for the care, fitting and showing of their animals. Parents or leaders may provide reasonable assistance. 4-H or FFA members found to be in violation of this rule will not be allowed to show in any divisions of the fair.
- 7. Food and Drug Administration regulations governing management and safety practices of approved withdrawal times from health aids and growth stimulants must be followed. A Livestock Drug Withdrawal form must be signed for all market animals. No tranquilizers in any form may be administered to any animal at fair. Proceeds of sale of animal suspected of violating this rule will be withheld pending blood test results.
- 8. All 4-H and FFA members MUST clean stalls prior to leaving the fairgrounds in order to receive premium money. This is in addition to the regular set up and clean up.

- All members showing and selling market animals must be enrolled in the market animal project. Market animals must be shown in their market class in order to be sold.
- 10. Minimum weight for **Market Lamb** is 115 pounds. Sale buyers WILL NOT be charged for pounds over 165.
- Minimum weight for Market Swine is 200 pounds. Sale buyers WILL NOT be changed for pounds over 325.
- 12. Minimum weight for **Market Steer** is 1100 pounds. Sale buyers WILL NOT be charged for pounds over 1600.
- Minimum weight for Market Goats is 70 pounds. Sale buyers WILL NOT be charged for pounds over 120.
- 14. Market lambs must be shorn within 7 days of the Fair.
- 15. Any uncontrollable animal will be removed from the fairgrounds. If necessary, a decision by the show committee will be made. The show committee for each livestock division is the Livestock Superintendent, a 4-H Council Member and the Extension Agent.
- 16. The Judith Basin County Fair is not a terminal show.
- 17. **Bred & Owned Breeding Beef Division 402:** Bred & Owned classes are not breed specific. A bred & owned animal is one where the 4-H member owned the dam of the calf at the time of the calf's conception and is enrolled in the beef breeding project. If the calf is registered, the 4-H member must be listed as the Breeder, first and continuous owner on the registration certificate. No joint ownership is allowed. If the animal is not registered, the 4-H member must be the owner of the brand the animal bears. If the animal(s) are unbranded and unregistered, they may show in the commercial or ranch raised division.
- **18. Breeding Beef Ranch Raised Division 405:** Ranch raised classes are not breed specific. A ranch raised animal is one where the 4-H member or the 4-H member's family owned the dam of the calf at the time of the calf's conception and is enrolled in the beef breeding project. Joint ownership is allowed. The animal does not qualify for the Bred & Owned and is not registered. If the animal is branded, the brand must be registered to the 4-H member's family.
- 19. Breeding Swine Division 102: Bred & owned classes are not breed specific. A bred & owned animal is one where the 4-H member owned the dam of the piglet at the time of the piglet's conception and is enrolled in the swine breeding project. If the piglet is registered, the 4-H member must be listed as the Breeder, first and continuous owner on the registration certificate. No joint ownership is allowed.



- 20. **Breeding Sheep Division 202—Bred & Owned:** Bred & owned classes are not breed specific. A bred & owned animal is one where the 4-H member owned the dam of the lamb at the time of the lamb's conception and is enrolled in the sheep breeding project. If the lamb is registered, the 4-H member must be listed as the Breeder, first and continuous owner on the registration certificate. No joint ownership is allowed. If the animal(s) are unregistered, they may show in the wool or meat breed divisions.
- 21. **Breeding Goat Division 302—Bred & Owned:** Bred & owned classes are not breed specific. A bred & owned animal is one where the 4-H member owned the dam of the kid at the time of the kid's conception and is enrolled in the goat breeding project. If the kid is registered, the 4-H member must be listed as the Breeder, first and continuous owner on the registration certificate. No joint ownership is allowed. If the animal(s) are unregistered, they may show in the dairy or meat breed divisions.

Showmanship Guidelines


Exhibitors must show their own project animal in showmanship, no substitutions or exceptions. The order of classes will be Seniors, Intermediates and Juniors last. Attire for all livestock showmanship classes should be a long-sleeved, collared, buttoned-up shirt, nice long pants (with no rip or fading), and closed-toed clean shoes. Boots are required with cattle and horses. A hat is mandatory for horse classes. FFA members must wear official dress.

Round Robin Showmanship Contest

The Round Robin Showmanship Contest consist of Senior, Intermediate and Junior Champion Showman from each of the livestock showmanship classes, showing the animal they won the class with. Same animal is required or Champion will defer to the Reserve Champion. If the judge does not award a Grand or Reserve in any of the contests, it will be up to the judge's discretion who, if anyone, will participate in the Round Robin contest.

Horse Rules

The judging criteria will be according to the State 4-H Horse Show Rule Book. All elective classes are open to 4-H Horses only (horses used in Western, English, and/or Ranch Horse Levels). The County Horse Show will include a bit check.



Livestock Sale

- The Youth Livestock Auction Sale will be held in the arena at 6:00PM FRIDAY AUGUST 1, 2025. White ribbon animals will not sell, including Replacement Heifers. Sale Order: swine, beef, sheep/goat, poultry.
- Up to 3% of gross receipts from the sale will be deducted from every 4-H member to help pay the cost of grading carcasses, applicable check-off fees, trucking, and related expenses.
- 3. Each 4-H member selling a steer or replacement heifer must have a bill of sale indicating ownership signed by the member by 1:00 pm the day of the sale.
- Exceptions due to special circumstances regarding the showing and selling of 4-H and FFA
 project animals must be approved in advance by the 4-H Livestock Committee.
- 5. All Replacement Sale Heifers must be pregnant and exhibitors must be able to provide proof of pregnancy at the time of the auction in order to sell.
- 6. The Fair Board will evaluate all animals before being sold. Each exhibitor may sell ONE market animal only, except for an exhibitor who has both Grand and Reserve Champion animals. All Grand and Reserve Champion market animals must sell at the Livestock Sale.
- Animals sold at the sale will have priority for trucking. Animals that are shown, but not sold
 will be hauled as space allows and will be charged freight. Arrangements must be made prior
 to sale day with the Sale Committee.
- 8. All goats & sheep brought onto the fairgrounds must be scrapie tagged.

Ultrasound Competition

All animals shown and placed as live market animals are eligible for the carcass competition, including white ribbon animals. Ultrasounds will be conducted on Friday August 1 beginning at 8am. Order will be Beef, Swine, Sheep/Goat. Exhibitors are responsible for getting their own animals to the ultrasound station. Ultrasound carcass data will be made in accordance with Montana State University Extension standards for Steer of Merit, Swine Symbol of Excellence, and Montana Certified Lamb carcass programs. This data will be made available to all exhibitors and other interested persons at the Judith Basin County Extension Office.

Gardening Exhibit Guidelines

Vegetables must be clean and displayed neatly on a 6" paper plate in a plastic bag if possible. Exhibits will be judged for uniformity, variety, characteristics, freedom from disease, insects and injury, as well as knowledge of the member being interviewed. Following judging, one vegetable specimen will be left for display and the rest may be taken home. Exhibitors must use only flowers, fruits and vegetables grown in their own garden.

Leathercraft Exhibit Guidelines

Leathercraft Exhibits should portray your abilities to: use basic leather tools, punch holes for lacing, lace, apply a leather finish, transfer a design, prepare leather for tooling, select leather and an understanding of the history of leathercraft. Basic tools should be used; modeling tool, camouflage tool, pear shader, veiner, seeder, backgrounder, mallet, lacing needle, and lacing punch. A swivel knife may not be used.

Food Exhibit Instructions

Members must be enrolled in a food project to exhibit in this class.

All food exhibits must be labeled with name and class plainly printed on entry tags.

All food projects require a recipe to be attached.

All food exhibits should be displayed on disposable containers appropriate to the size of the exhibit and placed in a clear plastic bag and sealed.

For large recipe food items such as one-dish meals, bring one serving size for judging to avoid food waste. For items that are perishable and may not display well during the fair, please bring the food item to be judged, and then leave a photo of the item with an entry tag for display.

Four cookies, doughnuts, muffins are to be placed on small disposable plates. Rolls, breads and tea rings can be placed on 8-10" disposable plate or cardboard cut to fit. All items should be placed in plastic bags and sealed. Exhibit inside, not corner pieces or bar cookies. Bring whole loaf of bread, pie, or cake. 3/4 of each exhibit may be taken home after judging, leaving 1/4 for display.

All canning exhibits must be in standard canning jars, with new metal lids and bands and be properly labeled with product name, date of preparation, processing method and processing time. Entry tags must be secured to the exhibit. Pickles, relishes, jams, jellies, etc. are to be processed in boiling water canners. Meats and low acid vegetables must be processed in a pressure canner. Tomatoes may be processed in boiling water canners if lemon juice or citric acid is added.

Judges are not required to taste all food items.





- 6. Entry Tags should be stapled on the lower edge of the entry. Please do not staple under the school and grade. After the entries are judged, the lower part of the tag is folded down that that the school name is visible.
- Creative writing entries should be proofread and should be entered in book form whenever possible. Entries will be subdivided into separate lots for poems and stories.
- 8. Due to space constraints, there is a limit of eight entries per grade and two cooperative projects per school.

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

The following percentages will be utilized for this category; 50% workmanship, 25% appearance, 25% materials, design and color.

All due care and caution is taken to watch the exhibit building during the fair. No responsibility is assumed by the Judith Basin Fair or those in charge in case of loss or damage to any exhibit while on the fairgrounds.

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

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



