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GENERAL RULES OF 4-H EXHIBITS

- 1. Entries in this department are exclusively for boys and girls between the ages of 6 -19 who are generally enrolled members with records and project work in good standing with 4-H clubs in Valley County. (See section below on this page Member in Good Standing Criteria.)
- 2. All entries are to be made on 4-H entry blanks which can be obtained by calling or writing to the Valley County Extension Office, 501 Court Square, Box 12, Glasgow. These entry blanks should be sent to the Valley County Extension Office no later than **JULY 16, 2025.**
- 3.. You must also sign up for an interview judging time at the Extension Office.
- 4. When filling out your entry blanks on the 4-H entry forms, please use a separate blank for livestock and a separate blank for the 4-H Quonset exhibits.
- 5. Bring exhibits for interview judging to the Valley Event Center. Interview Judging will be held on August 4 starting at 5:30 p.m. in the Valley Event Center. Following the interview judging you will take your exhibits to the 4-H building to be kept there until 4:00 pm SATURDAY, AUGUST 9. Exhibits may be removed starting at 4:00 pm Saturday, August 9 (except where specified). This does not include livestock. Check with department superintendents prior to loading or removing any animals. There will be no early removal of fair entries, except for veterinarian reasons, or prize money will not be paid.
- 6. All 4-H exhibits will be judged by the group award system of placing according to the quality of the exhibit. Qualifying exhibits will be judged in three groups. First Blue Ribbon, Second Red Ribbon, Third White Ribbon group. If no exhibit in a lot merits a blue ribbon, none will be given.
- 7. 4-H members may exhibit only in the project in which they are currently enrolled. If members wish to exhibit in classes other than those which they are enrolled in, they may compete in open class. Those competing in open class must fill out open class blanks.
- 8. All out of county 4-H members who wish to enter exhibits at the Valley County 4-H & FFA must do so under open class. See open class rules.
- 9. Premiums will be paid according to the official award entered in the Judge's Record and **NOT** on premium tags or ribbons. The Judge's record shall be final. **Be sure to turn in your judging sheet following interview judging.**
- 9. No premium will be awarded for an exhibit not listed on the official entry blank.
- 10. No 4-H entry blanks will be accepted once interview judging has begun.

Member in Good Standing Criteria -

These expectations must be met by fair time to enter projects in the fair:

- 1. Member must be enrolled in 4-H and have paid their dues.
- 2. Member must attend at least three club meetings during the 4-H year. For new members, that didn't join at the beginning of the year they must attend 50% of the meetings from the time that they joined.
- 3. Each member must log 10 hours of community service each year with a minimum of three hours at the county level to exhibit at the fair. The Extension Office will keep a log of those that participate in county level service and club leaders will need to keep a log for hours served with their clubs.
- 4. Record books must be up to date at the time of their fair interview for all projects.
- 5. Each member must attend at least two county level activities.
- 6. Each member must participate in a demonstration at their club or county level. If they have not done this by fair time, they will be required to sign up for a demonstration at the fair.

INTERVIEW JUDGING

All 4-H Animal Project Books should be entered in 4-H Department PB, Class 200. Please refer to the index.

Interview judging will be done in all project areas, **except live animals.** All items that you are planning on exhibiting in these areas must have a 4-H entry blank submitted to the Extension Office by **JULY 16, 2025**. You must also sign up on the interview judging time schedule which is at the office.

NOTE: In regards to all livestock (beef, sheep, goats, swine, horses, rabbits & poultry), if required activities are not completed in the 4-H Project Manuals, the 4-H'er will be asked to meet with a designated committee and if no corrective action is taken by the member, they will not be allowed to show their market livestock animal (beef, sheep, swine, goat, poultry, rabbit) at the fair.

Number of completed activities required.

- Beef, Sheep, Swine, Goat, Poultry, Rabbit Completion of five (5) activities is required to show and/or sell at the fair. Activities can be completed in any of the (3) activity guides, with the permission of a club leader.
- Horse All activities at project level must be completed in the member's first year of enrollment. If a member remains in that level the following year(s), three (3) challenge activities designed by the member and horse leader will be required to show/sell.

What Is Interview Judging?

Interview Judging is one method of helping you evaluate your work. It involves the 4-H member (you) having a consultation with the judge during the judging of the exhibit.

Together you evaluate the project or part of a project, basing the evaluation both on a pre-determined standard or criteria, and on the goals of the member in doing the project.

Interview judging of projects in 4-H merely means that the 4-H member and the adult or judge have the opportunity to go over the article to be evaluated. Together they decide how much progress has been made or in what ribbon classification it should be placed.

With interview judging, each individual has the opportunity to determine his/her own starting point, take note of the progress he/she feels he/she has made, and set the direction of his/her future growth.

Parents are not allowed in the building during judging.

Please make sure you have entry tags attached to all your exhibits before you come to the fair. These are available in the Extension Office.

If you do not know your 4-H Exhibitor Number call the Extension Office at 228-6241.

If you have never been interview judged, ask a leader, older 4-H member how it works, or call the Extension Office.

STEPS IN INTERVIEW JUDGING:

- 1. 4-H member takes his/her own exhibit to the judge.
- 2. Member and judge sit down together to discuss article.
- 3. Discuss and evaluate article.
- 4. Judge and member decide on placing.
- 5. Discussion on ways to improve project for next year.
- 6. Receive ribbon
- 7. Be sure and return the judging sheet to check-in desk.

- Jams and jellies must be standard canning jars and processed in the water bath. NO PARAFFIN MAY BE USED.
- All exhibits except canned items must be covered with plastic wrap.

- *Number of animals exhibited in that project & completed record system could be taken into consideration
- *STEERS will NO LONGER be considered for this award

The above guidelines would be especially helpful in the event of a close decision. Just because the buckle is available does not mean it has to be awarded. This is a special award given by Black Angus producers. If no one is deserving of the award, the award will be kept for next year. The donor and the Angus Auxiliary appreciate hearing from the winner of this award.

MONTANA ANGUS ASSOCIATION is offering a jacket award. This award will be given to the winning Champion Black Angus Breeding Project.

To claim the jacket, the following guidelines must be met:

- 2. Clean and bed stall, pen or area. Police immediate area.
- 3. Have knowledge of animals, age (birth date) breeding, weight etc. as needed for registration or judging.
- 4. Grooming and preparation of animals for judging or showing.
- 5. Dress in proper attire when showing animals.
- 6. Show respect consideration proper attitude and cooperation toward ALL animals, members, equipment, supplies
- 7. and facilities as well as judges and spectators.
- 8. Fill out and properly display livestock stall cards.
- 9. When exercising or taking your animal in and out of the building, clean up after them.
- 10. Display a banner in the center of your club entries in each building.

Only 4-H members shall care for 4-H livestock, unless with good reason (such as the health and welfare of the exhibitor and/or animal), other arrangements are made with the superintendent in charge. Only 4-H club members shall hold animals in the show ring. All livestock exhibits shall be shown and brought before the judge by the boy or girl owning the exhibit, unless excused by the superintendent or county agent.

DOG RULES:

- Dogs will be able to compete in the same class for three years regardless of the ribbon awarded.

- Dogs that have a CDX (Companion Dog Excellence) may compete in Advanced for one (1) year, then must compete in Utility. Once in Utility, they may stay in that class.
- 4. Dogs must be on a leash unless requested by judge.
- Dogs must show proof of vaccinations (rabies, dist./parvo) on or before the fair. All entries will be veterinarian inspected upon arrival, prior to the show, refer to schedule.
- 6. Any Dog that "soils" while in the ring may be moved to the bottom of the class at the judge's discretion.
- 7. Any dog in heat will not be permitted to show.

Entry blanks are due into the Extension for the Dog Show no later than JULY 16, 2025. Prizes will be announced and awarded the day of event.

OVERALL LIVESTOCK EXHIBIT RULES

BEEF, SHEEP, SWINE, HORSES, DAIRY COWS & GOATS, RABBIT & POULTRY EXHIBIT RULES

- 1. To exhibit livestock, five (5) activities must be completed in project book activity guide, record book must be upto-date and must be a "Member in Good Standing" refer to General Rules of 4-H Exhibits. (note: activities can be completed in any of the three (3) levels of project book activity guides, with the permission of a club leader.) NOTE: HORSE All activities at project level must be completed in the member's first year of enrollment. If a member remains in that level the following year(s), three (3) challenge activities designed by the member and horse leader will be required to show/sell.
- 2. Only 4-H members shall care for 4-H livestock unless, with good reason, other arrangements are made with the superintendent in charge. Only 4-H club members shall hold animals in the show ring. All livestock exhibits shall be shown and brought before the judge by the boy or girl owning the exhibit, unless excused by the superintendent and county agent. Otherwise, failure to be on hand when exhibits are judged may mean that the exhibit would not be judged.
- For livestock, the judges are instructed to prefer the highest degree of excellence obtainable, considering conformation, finish, quality, and age and weight; to recognize the highest quality and cutability that animals on foot shall ultimately produce.
- Market livestock will be judged based on existing market classification. Livestock will be judged under the group system and awarded Blue, Red and White ribbons according to grade.
- The judge is encouraged to give constructive criticism and suggestions for improvement, as well as point out superior performance to exhibitors whenever possible.
- The judge and/or superintendent has the authority to tie, pen or dismiss, at any time, an entry that is unruly or not in sufficient control for the safety of the exhibitor, other exhibitors, and spectators.
- 7. No person other than the exhibitor and Show Officials will be allowed in the ring while the show is in progress.
- All animals shall stay in the show ring after they are judged, until the clerk has entered their placing in the class.
- Exhibitors cannot use the same animal for 4-H and FFA entries - this includes wool. To compete in Open Class, the 4-H'er or FFA'er must have another animal entered in Open Class.
- 10. All livestock entries (large & small animals inclusive) will be veterinarian inspected entry day. Note: Swine will be inspected prior to being penned and/or weighed. Refer to 4-H Schedule for entry times. All exhibits must stay in place through Saturday. There will be no early withdrawal of fair exhibits, except for veterinary reasons, or prize money will not be paid. Check with Department Superintendents prior to loading or removing animals.
- 11. A veterinarian and/or all superintendents have the right to reject entries of any animals for health reasons.
- 12. An exhibitor may enter only one exhibit per lot except for breeding stock: "any other classes".

- 13. Dress Code for showing & selling livestock at the Fair
 A. All contestants must wear shirts with long sleeves that
 - A. All contestants must wear shirts with long sleeves that button or snap up the front. (No tank tops, T-shirts, or polo shirts)
 - B. Wear clean pants or slacks with long legs (no shorts, cut offs, culottes, capris, etc.).
 - C. Contestants may wear either boots or shoes (no thongs, sandals, or untied shoes). BOOTS ARE RECOMMENDED.
 - D. Contestants may wear western hats (no caps).
 - E. HORSES HAVE A SEPARATE SET OF DRESS CODE RULES. Refer to Horse Rules.
- 14. Only 4-H members shall fit animals for showing after arrival at the fair unless it is a matter of safety and health for the child and/or animal.
- 15. All livestock exhibitors must wear their exhibitor number pinned (or in a halter) to the back of their shirt when showing their animals. The laminated numbers will be used again next year, so please turn your number in at the end of the fair. A fee may be assessed if the laminated exhibitor number is not returned at the end of fair. Exhibitors should memorize their 4-H exhibitor number. (The number should stay the same through your 4-H career and is also your Open Class Exhibitor Number.)
- 16. When showing an exhibit which consists of two or more animals, only the exhibitor should be wearing an exhibitor number. (Example: a pair of calves or a pen of 3 market animals)
- As an exhibitor, your behavior attitude and ability are important. Sportsmanship and temperament are good indicators of a good show person.
- 18. All livestock entries must have two or more entries before a Grand Champion can be picked and three or more before a Reserve Champion can be selected, unless Judge feels it's warranted.
- 19. 4-H members must be present when exhibits are being judged in the 4-H Livestock Breeding Projects.
- 20. **SENIOR DIVISION: 4-**H'ers who are 14 and over as of October 1, 2024, will compete in the (SENIOR DIVISION)
- JUNIOR DIVISION: 4-H'ers age 11-13 as of October 1, 2024, will compete in the (JUNIOR DIVISION)
- 22. **PRE-JUNIOR DIVISION**: 4-H age 8 10 as of October 1, 2024 will compete in the (PRE-JUNIOR DIVISION)
- 23. Breeding Animal entries cannot be sold at the Valley County 4-H & FFA Livestock Sale.
- Market animals will be disqualified from 4-H competition if not properly identified.
- 25. No "FOR SALE" signs or advertising can be placed on any exhibit entered on competition.
- 26. In the event an exhibitor weighs-in two market animals of the same species, one to be exhibited in 4-H/FFA and the other in open class, the exhibitor to let the department superintendents know at the time of weigh-in, which animal is to be exhibited in 4-H/FFA market class.
- 27. In the event a class needs to be split due to the number of exhibits/exhibitors, the split(s) will be done by random drawing. The number of exhibits/exhibitors from each split to return back for selection of the top placing(s) of the class, will be determined by the judge.
 - 4-H'ers should be conscious of their appearance at all times when working with their livestock.

4-H LIVESTOCK BUILDING RULES --

- When an animal is brought in, fill out a livestock stall card. These are available from a livestock superintendent. Please print the information on your stall card so that the public viewing your exhibit can read it.
- Livestock must be clean and groomed for display to the public.
- Feed and water livestock regularly and exercise daily to remind animals of their training.
- 4. Pens & Stalls are to be kept clean. Refer to 4-H Schedule for daily times, the cleaning of pens & stalls is to be completed by. Check with Superintendents where to pile the manure for truck pick up.
- Tie cattle firmly and not too long a lead rope and to ensure extra safety, they will also be tied with a neck rope.
- 6. All alleys in all barns are to be kept clean for public.
- 7. Ask questions of Department Superintendents.
- Cooperation among all 4-H members will make your exhibits successful.
- 9. No animals beyond barn areas.
- 10. No vehicles on the ground area.
- 11. Exercise and training can be done in the Exercise Arena behind the Sheep barn.
- 12. 4-H youth are encouraged to familiarize their livestock to the show arena prior to judging.
- 13. Do not feed, groom, or tie up any livestock in the grassed showmanship arena and bleacher area.

LIVESTOCK SALE RULES

BEEF, SHEEP, SWINE, HORSE, POULTRY, RABBIT AND GOATS

- Open to all boys and girls in Valley County who are currently enrolled in 4-H or FFA and have met the requirements to exhibit livestock at the fair.
- Only one market animal per youth, per livestock species can be sold. (Exception: Poultry – refer to Poultry meat classes section page 38.) EXAMPLE: A 4-H member that also belongs to FFA has two swine exhibited in both 4-H and FFA., they must decide to sell only one of the swine at the sale. They then could also sell one beef and one sheep.
- A "brand inspection slip" must be presented to the beef superintendent along with \$2.00 (\$1.00 Brand Inspection Fee, \$1.00 Beef Council Fee), when the market beef is weighed in.
- All sale animals must have complied with Valley County 4-H scheduled tag-in/weigh-in dates, if applicable, and/or any requirements specific to each species.
- 4-H members selling livestock will be billed for the picture and "thank you" to buyer, federal grader cost, advertising cost, trucking, etc. or have the amount taken out of their sale check.
- If members wish to sell their second market animal, they must do so on their own. (Suggest a packing plant on grade and yield, to a private party or through the auction ring such as the Glasgow Stockyards, Inc).

- The auction is supported by the Glasgow Chamber of Commerce, Agriculture Committee.
- Terms of the sale are cash. Livestock buyers must pay for their animal to the clerks after purchasing or IMMEDIATELY following the sale. Checks are to be made out to VALLEY COUNTY 4-H & FFA LIVESTOCK SALE.
- Beef will be harvested and entered in the Montana Steer of Merit competition sponsored by the MT Stockgrower's.
- 10. The sheep and swine will also be harvested and measured for carcass data.
- 11. The animal's official sale weight will be the weight registered on Entry Day.
- All youth selling animals in the Valley County 4-H & FFA Livestock Sale shall have their animals in show condition one half hour before the sale for viewing by prospective buyers.
- 13. White Ribbon animals cannot be sold at the Valley County 4-H & FFA Livestock Sale. Selling of a white ribbon animal is the exhibitor's responsibility.
- 14. All Sale livestock must remain in the barns until the Saleclerk transactions are completed and all brand enforcement paperwork is done. Do not load any sale livestock until you are given permission by your superintendents to do so. Any 4-H/FFA livestock sale animal leaving the fairgrounds without department superintendent permission, will be fined 10% of gross sale proceeds which will be deducted from members livestock sale check.
- 15. Resale animals will be sold at the end of the sale.
- 16. A MARKET ANIMAL POST FAIR AGREEMENT FORM must be completed for any market animal sold at the Valley County 4-H & FFA Livestock Sale which is not going directly to harvest following the sale. The form must be signed by the buyer, seller, seller's parent or guardian and the department superintendent prior to animal leaving the fairgrounds.
- All 4-H/FFA members must be current on Animal Quality Assurance Training in their age division.

4-H LIVESTOCK CODE OF ETHICS

Believing it is in the best interest of all breeders of all livestock to maintain a reputation of integrity and to continue to present a wholesome and progressive image in the show ring, the Fair Board and the 4-H Livestock Committee lists those practices which are considered unacceptable in presenting livestock in the show ring. The use of such practices and procedures is, therefore, considered unethical in the showing of all livestock at the Northeast Montana Fair. The 4-H Livestock Code of Ethics applies to all livestock (open, FFA and 4-H) shown at the Northeast Montana Fair and/or any other sponsored 4-H event (added March 12, 2019).

All Exhibitors and their families are encouraged to conduct themselves in a positive, honest, sportsmanlike manner during the fair and shows. Losing gracefully is just as important as winning humbly.

- Criticizing or interfering with the judge, other exhibitors or superintendents while attending the fair or show may result in an individual or group being expelled, placed on probation or declared ineligible to exhibit at the fair.
- Unsportsmanlike conduct, such as abusive language to show officials, superintendents, other exhibitors, or spectators is prohibited.
- 3. Misrepresenting the age of the animal for the class in which it is shown is prohibited.
- 4. All animals are to be treated in a humane manner. Adequate feed, water and shelter are to be provided at all times. Physically abusing an animal is unacceptable at all times and maltreatment of animals will not be tolerated. Exhibitors who abuse their animals, for whatever reasons, will be disqualified for the fair.
- 5. Administration of a drug of any kind or description, internally or externally, except for treating a recognized disease or injury, is prohibited. For the purpose of these rules, the term "drug" shall mean any substance, the sale, possession, or use of which is controlled by license under federal, state or local laws or regulations and any substance used by the medical or veterinary professions which affect the circulatory, respiratory or central nervous system of an animal. The use if any diuretic on any animal at the fair is prohibited.
- 6. The Livestock Committee reserves the right to call in a veterinarian for testing.
- The use of alcoholic beverages in the feed or administered as a drench is prohibited.
- 8. Treating or massaging any part of the body internally or externally with an irritant, counter-irritant, or other substance to temporarily straighten a week back or loin or to produce unnatural animation is prohibited.
- Minimizing the effects of campiness by feeding or injecting drugs or depressants, by applying packs, or by using any artificial contrivance or therapeutic treatment exempting normal exercise is prohibited.
- Striking the animal to cause swelling in a depressed area is prohibited.

- 11. Surgery or any other procedure performed to change the natural process of growth, maturation, contour or appearance of any animal, to include teeth, is prohibited. Not included is removal of teats or horns, clipping and dressing of hair and trimming of hooves.
- 12. Insertion of foreign material under the skin is prohibited.
- 13. Any attempt to change the natural color of any animal, either purebred or crossbred by changing the color or adding false hair, fleece or skin at any point, spot or area of the animal's body is prohibited.
- Balancing the udder by an abnormal means including the use of a mechanical contrivance or the injection of fluid or drugs is prohibited.
- Setting the teats and/or occluding (sealing the ends) with a mechanical contrivance or with the use of a chemical preparation is prohibited.
- 16. Treating or massaging the udder or its attachments with an irritant or counterirritant is prohibited. The use of common products such as fly spray, ointment, or liniment in excess to the extent that is irritating is included as an irritant unless required to reduce edema at time of calving.
- 17. Any violation of the rules and regulations incorporated in the Premium Book, the Show ring code of Ethics and Livestock Rules and Regulations may result in forfeiture of all premiums and awards, disqualification, expulsion or probation of the exhibitor or organized group the exhibitor represents, and the exhibit or livestock involved. Probation, disqualification, expulsion, or other disciplinary action of the Valley County 4-H Livestock Executive committee and Valley County 4-H Council Executive committee will be final. Such action will require application for readmission under such terms as the Valley County 4-H Livestock Executive committee and Valley County 4-H Council Executive committee may prescribe before the group or individual is allowed to exhibit at future events. (revised March 12, 2019)

HERDSMAN: Manager, breeder, or tender of livestock

MANAGER: One that manages. To direct or handle with a degree of skill.

BREEDER: One that breeds as - One engaged in the breeding of a special organism (animal).

TENDER: To present for acceptance

HORSE -- DEPARTMENT -- ZHH

HORSE SHOW AND BASIC HORSEMANSHIP POLICIES:

- A. A member may use any of their project horses which must also be shown/exhibited in another class for showmanship. Refer to 4-H Department ZS.
- B. To qualify for the All-Around Award, you must compete on only one (1) horse in same age division. All around is based on the horse. Hi-Point is based on the rider.
- C. Only 4-H & FFA members with Horse Projects are eligible for competition.
- D. Book check-offs will be completed before 1:00 PM on the first day of the show.
- E. For detailed information on the judging of Horsemanship I VII refer to MONTANA 4-H HORSEMANSHIP PROJECTS, #1160 (Reprinted, May 1997). This is a seven (7) part program covering training, care, riding, equipment and anatomy of the mature horse.
- F. This show will determine eligibility for the State Horse Show. Member can use only the horses which he/she has competed on in this show.
- G. Age of 4-H member is determined as of October 1, 2024 and age of horse is determined as of January 1, 2025. For the purpose of determining eligibility for competition, the age of the horse shall be computed by the calendar year starting January 1 of the year foaled. (Example: a horse foaled anytime in 2024 will be termed one-year-old on January 1, 2025)
- H. Entry blanks must be turned in at the County Extension Office by JULY 16, 2025.
- I. Project rules are listed on pages 4 & 5 of Revised Bulletin #1160. Please read before you attend the show.
- J. For each horse being entered/exhibited at the far, an identification card must be on file at the Valley County Extension Office by June 1st to participate in the Fair and/or the State Horse Show. The identification cards can be obtained at the Extension Office. Each exhibitor is allowed one alternate horse for each project, excluding training horse projects (Colt to Maturity & Green Horse). The alternate horse must be designated as such on the horse ID card along with the potential projects listed.
- K. Exception to rule if all horses listed on exhibitor's horse ID cards turned in by June 1st, including alternate horses that are injured, did not pass the vet check, are deceased, etc. The exhibitor is to exhaust all options to locate an immediate family member's horse to use.

If no family horse is available, the exhibitor may request to use another 4-H member's alternate horse upon the Livestock Committee & 4-H Council's approval.

- L. If an exhibitor files an exemption rule to use a horse not listed as an alternate, the exhibitor will automatically be removed from eligibility for High Point or All-Around rewards.
- M. Round Robin horse candidates must have a current 4-H horse ID card on file to be eligible for use.
- N. The Horse Declaration Form is due with Entry Blanks.
 Please list the horse you will be riding in each class. If
 exhibitors must change which horse will be used in a
 class, the clerk will be notified by the gatekeeper
 before they are allowed to enter the arena.
- O. Gate call. The exhibitor will be allowed three gate calls before they are scratched from the class as a no-show.

All Ranch Horse projects levels will include Cattle Work.

- P. Appropriate dress attire. (long-sleeve shirt, boots, hat and helmet)
- Q. Dress code, tack, and show etiquette are to be followed at all times as per the rule book. Review of dress code, safety, and appropriate tack (depending on horse's age, project, etc.) to be completed at each exhibitor's assessment.
- R. Every parent and exhibitor is REQUIRED to read the Montana 4-H Horse Program Bit Rules and Equipment Guide

- S. A certified equestrian Horse helmet with safety harness fastened in place is required in over fence classes and gymkhana events, activities, and practice sessions.
- T. Signed Form on file in the office acknowledgement of receiving horse helmet education.
- U. All entries will be veterinarian inspected at a designated time before the show. This time will be communicated with all horse members.
- Refer to overall livestock exhibit rules, livestock building rules, large animal showmanship rules and 4-H Code of Ethics.
- W. Awards: Ribbons will be handed out at the gate after class placement is announced from the crows nest as exhibitors leave the arena. All age division placements will be announced.
- X. The points spreadsheet will be physically posted and updated for the public viewing by the end of each show day. If a discrepancy is noted, contact Roubie Younkin for further review.



4-H MARKET BEEF RULES

- 1. Age of Exhibitor - A 4-H member must be eleven (11) years old by Oct. 1, 2024 to carry a Market Beef Project.
- 2. Entries are limited to market steers or spayed heifers, 18 months old or less. (Born after January 1, 2024)
- Please check your Market Beef for horns. Small, loose, moveable scurs are acceptable. Sharp, pointed horns or horns over one inch in length will not be allowed.
- 4. Market Beef must have been tagged and tattooed in the right ear, brand inspected (fees to be paid by member) and weighed at the Valley County 4-H fall scheduled weigh-in/tag-in day of the current 4-H year. Members can tag up to 2 (two) beef, but only 1 (one) can be entered as a 4-H Market Beef.
- 5. At entry day weigh-in, Market Beef are required to weigh a minimum of 950 pounds to be eligible to show in the market class and sell at the Valley County 4-H & FFA Livestock Sale. A feeder class will be created for market beef projects which do not make weight. Note: Once an official weight has been taken the animal can not be reweighed in an effort to make weight.
- 6. Animals must have been fed by the exhibitor at least by January 1, of the current year.
- 7. Market Beef **will not** be unloaded from trailers at the scale. They must be unloaded away from the scale then led to the scale. (Ex. unloaded at the beef barn).
- The metal 4-H ID tags in the steers are very durable; however, if your animal has lost one, you need to notify the County Agent as soon as possible.
- Any market Beef that does not have a 4-H ID tag or tattoo will be disqualified from live judging, showmanship, the Valley County 4-H & FFA Livestock Sale and Carcass Contest. You may choose to enter your market steer in Open Class.
- 10. A signed Bill of Sale (which may be the brand inspection slip) must be presented to the Beef Superintendent along with \$2.00 (\$1.00 Brand Inspection Fee, \$1.00 Beef Council Fee), when the Market Beef is weighed in at the fair.
- Market Beef will be divided into weight classes by the Beef Superintendents after they have been weighed in.
- All Market Beef will be tied firmly with not too long a lead rope and to ensure extra safety - - they will also be tied with a neck rope.
- Refer to overall livestock exhibit rules, livestock building rules, livestock sale rules, large animal showmanship rules and 4-H Code of Ethics.
- 14. All entries will be veterinarian inspected entry day.
- Beef to be trained to be handled by halter & show stick.

SHEEP - 4-H DEPARTMENT ZSH

GENERAL SHEEP RULES --

- It is recommended sheep be treated for parasites before entry day.
- Read the pesticide label, withdrawal time is generally 30 days before slaughter.
- Any entries found with external parasites may be disqualified.
- 4. No storing of sheep stands, hay, grain, grooming tools, etc. in sheep pens or alley way of the barn. Keep area neat.
- 5. No plastic twine allowed in barn.
- All entries, including a "pen of three market and a flock" are to be shown in the show ring.
- Refer to overall livestock exhibit rules, livestock building rules, livestock sale rules, large animal showmanship rules and 4-H Code of Ethics.
- The preferred method of docking is to NOT BODY DOCK (leave flaps of skin at the base of the tail when docking).
- 9. All entries will be veterinarian inspected entry day.
- Sheep to be trained to be handled and shown by the head. When showing a sheep, the sheep's front feet must remain on the ground while shown, except for setting feet.

SPECIAL MARKET LAMB RULES

- Entries limited to wether or ewe lambs born January 1, of current year or later. Cryptorchidism in wethers will be disqualified. Milk (baby) teeth must be in place.
- Market Lambs shall be tagged and weighed at the Valley County 4-H spring scheduled weigh-in/tag-in day of current year. Lambs shall also be shorn by the weighin/tag-in day. Superintendents will make arrangements for shearing, fees to be paid by the member. Members can tag up to 2 (two) lambs, but one 1 (one) can be entered as a 4-H Market Lamb.
- 3. At entry day weigh-in, Market Lambs are required to weigh a minimum of 100 pounds to be eligible to show in the market class and sell at the Valley County 4-H & FFA Livestock Sale. - Market Lambs will be judged according to weight, condition, cut ability and conformation.
- The Sheep Superintendent may divide the market lamb class by weight if necessary.

WOOL

PURPOSE: To encourage the production of higher quality wool, more uniform clips and better preparation for marketing and increased awareness of wool quality and its uses.

RULES:

- 1. Must be enrolled in a sheep project.
- 2. Only Montana grown fleeces will be eligible.
- 3. Twelve months growth of wool is the maximum permitted, except in the case of yearling fleeces.
- 4. All entries must be in the name of the grower.
- Factors affecting exhibit are: Twine used in tying fleece; excessive dung locks or tags; discoloration by excessive moisture and weakness of staple, presence of burrs, straw and dirt.
- Fleeces should be tied with paper fleece twine, flesh side out, in a manner to allow them to be handled without falling apart.
- The Fair Management reserves the right to retain any and all fleeces to be exhibited at other shows and then return them to the owner.
- 8. Judges will classify any and all exhibits.
- There must be two or more entries in each lot before a Grand Champion can be picked and three or more before a Reserve Champion can be selected, unless judge feels it is warranted. Wool exhibited in the 4-H Quonset.
- 10. 4-H wool entries cannot be moved to Open Class.



SPECIAL MARKET SWINE RULES:

- All market swine must be registered in the weigh-in/tag-in process every spring in order to be eligible to show.

It is the responsibility of the member and family to tag each market hog at home. Members are required to bring a color picture showing the market hog(s) with the tag in ear, breeder information and any other required paperwork to the fairgrounds during the scheduled spring weigh-in and turn into the Swine Superintendents. You do not need to bring your animal to the fairgrounds, only picture and breeder information, etc. Swine that are entered through a self-tag-in will not be eligible for the Rate of Gain competition.
- 3. At entry day weigh-in, Market Swine are required to weigh a minimum of 200 pounds to be eligible to show in the market class and sell at the Valley County 4-H & FFA Livestock Sale. A feeder class will be created for market swine projects which do not make weight. *Note:* Once an official weight has been taken the animal can not be reweighed in an effort to make weight.
- 4. Swine will be divided into weight classes by the Swine Superintendents after they have been weighed entry day.
- Barrows and gilts are eligible, may be of any breed or cross.
- 6. Reproductive defect in barrows will be disqualified.

SHOWMANSHIP & ROUND ROBIN

Showmanship contests (in the order of Senior, Junior & Pre-Junior Divisions) will be held before the judging of each class of the following animals: Beef, Dairy, Horse, Sheep, Swine & Goat.

Showmanship Awards will be presented immediately after each event. (Senior, Junior, Pre-junior). Buckles will be presented at Awards Day in the fall.

RUI FS:

- 1. 4-H members must exhibit in the class division (Pre-Junior, Junior or Senior) appropriate to their age.
- 2. Showmanship entries to be included on the 4-H'ers entry blank. Please double check your entries.
- 3. 4-H'ers must show/exhibit only their own animal. Animal shown must also be shown/exhibited by the 4-H'er in another 4-H Livestock Class at the fair, as an exhibit of a 4-H Livestock Project the 4-H'er is enrolled in.

4. Dress Code:

- · Showmanship Refer to Overall Livestock Rules.
- · Round Robin Contestants are required to follow the minimum Dress Code for the species they are bringing into the contest. Contestants are encouraged to follow the dress code of all species in the show.
- 5. All animals must be trained by the exhibitor and show evidence of training and fitting.
 - · Beef animals are to be handled by halter and show stick.
 - · Horses are to be handled by halter by MT Quarter horse rules.
 - **Dairy** are to be handled by halter.
 - **Swine** are to be handled by whip, plastic piping, stick, bat, or cane.
 - · Goats are to be shown by collar or small link chain When showing a goat, the goat's front feet must remain on the ground while shown, except for setting
 - Sheep are to be held by the head. When showing a sheep, the sheep's front feet must remain on the around while shown, except for setting feet.
- 6. Each class of livestock exhibitors will be awarded a ribbon (blue, red or white) and premium money in lots 1 -6 inclusive.
- Top Showmen in lot #'s 1 6 of classes 47, 48 & 49 will be awarded a belt buckle, and the Reserve Showman will be awarded a plaque provided they are blue ribbon showmen. Only blue-ribbon showmen will advance to Round Robin. (The Judge will determine if an entry warrants the Top Showman award regardless of the number of contestants.)
- The Grand and Reserve Champion Showmen of classes 47, 48 & 49, Lot #'s 1 - 6 will participate in the Round Robin Showmanship in either Pre-Junior, Junior or Senior Division for Grand Champion placing. Round Robin Showmanship will be held in the grassed show ring, refer to 4-H fair schedule for time. Senior Division will be the first to show followed by the Junior and Pre-Junior Divisions.

- Round Robin: If a 4-H'er is the Grand Champion Showman in more than one lot of Class 47, 48, 49, he/she must choose which lot (animal) he/she wants to show in the Round Robin. If a 4-H'er is the Reserve Champion Showman in more than one lot of Class 47, 48, or 49. he/she must choose which lot (animal) he or she wants to show in the Round Robin. If a Grand Champion Showman, must show Grand. If a 4-H'er has won in more than one lot, must notify the department superintendents of the animal they have chosen to show. Notification must be made to the superintendents no later than 1:00 p.m. Friday. The third-place showman, etc. provided they are a blue-ribbon showman, or the unchosen lot(s), will then be moved up to show his/her own animal in the Round Robin.
- 10. Each Round Robin contestant of the Pre-Junior, Junior & Senior Divisions may be showing a beef, horse, sheep, or swine in the show ring if species is available/entered in the fair. They may be showing a dairy and/or goat also in the showring. All contestants will start with "0" points.
- 11. If the Grand or Reserve showman of a lot of Class 47, 48 or 49 chooses not to show in the Round Robin, he or she will keep the buckle or plague won. The third-place showman, etc., provided they are blue ribbon showman, will then show his/her own animal in the Round Robin Livestock Showmanship.
- 12. In the event an animal is considered unsafe by the judge and/or superintendents during the Round Robin Showmanship, another animal will be selected by the superintendents and each contestant will show the newly selected animal for scoring purposes.

RABBITS/POULTRY -- Department - ZPR

GENERAL RULES: Due to the possibility of extreme heat that puts undue stress on rabbit and poultry, they will only be allowed at the fair during the following time:

- 1. Refer to the 4-H fair schedule for time the animals must be brought to the fair.
- Rabbits and poultry must be taken from pens and shown for judging. Exhibitors should be able to show their own animals and must be present or animals will be disgualified.
- Judging will begin with Class 1, at that time all members having exhibits in Lot #1 will bring them before the judge.
- Exhibition coops for poultry will be furnished by the fair manager. Exhibitor should bring their own lock and water bottles for coops.
- A pen of three or pairs may be divided and entered in individual lots.
- Refer to 4-H livestock exhibit rules and 4-H Livestock Code of Ethics.
- 7. All entries will be veterinarian inspected entry day.

SPECIAL MARKET RULES

- Exhibitors must notify the Extension Office, no later than June 1st, of current year, if they plan to sell their market poultry and/or rabbits at the Valley County 4-H & FFA Livestock Sale.
- 2. All market poultry & rabbits will be weighed at entry time.
